A guide for Defendants

Our mission is to divert non-violent defendants with mental illness from the Marion County Jail active criminal and prosecution to appropriate community based treatment support services to help those defendants build successful lives.

What is the Marion County Mental Health Court?

The Marion County Mental Health Court [MCMHC] is a special part of the Marion County Court. It is a Court-supervised program for those arrested in Marion County who have a mental illness, who need treatment and other services, and who choose to participate in the MCMHC instead of having their case proceed through the regular court process. If you agree to participate in the MCMHC, you will have a four week trial period during which you can choose to not continue with MCMHC.

What do I have to do?

The MCMHC Treatment Team will prepare a treatment plan for you based on an assessment of your needs for mental health, substance abuse and/or alcohol treatment, case management services, and housing. In order to participate in the MCMHC, you must agree to comply with your treatment plan.

How long will I be involved in the MCMHC?

Mental Health Court is a Three Phase program that lasts for 6 months to a year. The amount of time you actually spend in Mental Health Court is determined by your participation and by your progress. While you are participating in Mental Health Court, the Judge and the Mental Health Court Treatment Team will monitor your participation and progress in treatment.

What's in it for me?

Opportunity: The MCMHC offers you a chance to avoid jail on your current charge and to move forward in your life. Remember that there are many people who make up the MCMHC Treatment Team and they all want to see you succeed. If you take advantage of the assistance offered, you can discover many ways to make a better life for yourself.

Services: The MCMHC will help you get case management services, mental health treatment, involved with a support group, and if your treatment plan calls for it, substance abuse or alcohol treatment and supported housing.

Recognition of progress: As you progress through the phases of your treatment plan, the MCMHC Judge will recognize your achievements and you will receive acknowledgement of your accomplishments.

Outcome of Case?

When you graduate from Mental Health Court, your case will be dismissed.

What do I need to do to participate?

Be Honest: The Mental Health Court Treatment Team is here to help you in your recovery process. We recognize that recovery is not an easy path, and we want to help you continue your progress around any obstacles that you may encounter. If you are not honest with the Team, we will be unable to help you appropriately.

Waiver of Confidentiality Consent: To participate in Mental Health Court you must sign a Consent Form Waiver, a waiver of confidentiality among Mental Health Team members. This means that your doctor, social workers and other Team members are free to share appropriate information about your treatment program and your progress.
